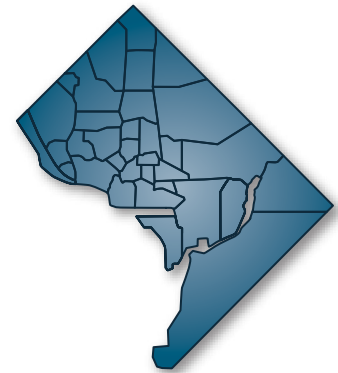




# ORN Data Brief: The District of Columbia

The *Opioid Response Network (ORN)*, funded by SAMHSA, was established to provide local training and educational resources. *ORN* supports locally identified needs and promotes evidence-based practices for opioid use disorder (OUD) and stimulant use disorder in the areas of prevention, treatment, and recovery. This data brief describes *ORN*'s technical assistance (TA) efforts, including training and education, in the District of Columbia



## Overall Impact in District of Columbia

Common unique population TA requests

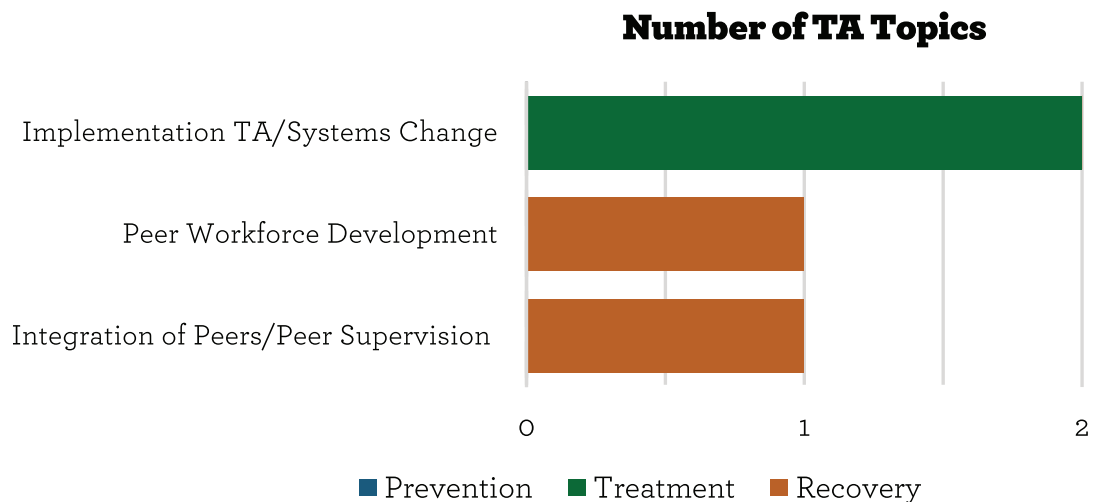
- 9 requests for people with criminal justice involvement
- 7 requests related to people who are uninsured or underinsured
- 6 requests related to people living in urban areas

## Top TA Activity Topics

**Implementation TA and Systems Change for Treatment was the most frequent topic** of the 4 TA activities conducted in the District of Columbia. Additional **TA topics focused on peer workforce development and integration of peers/peer supervision.**

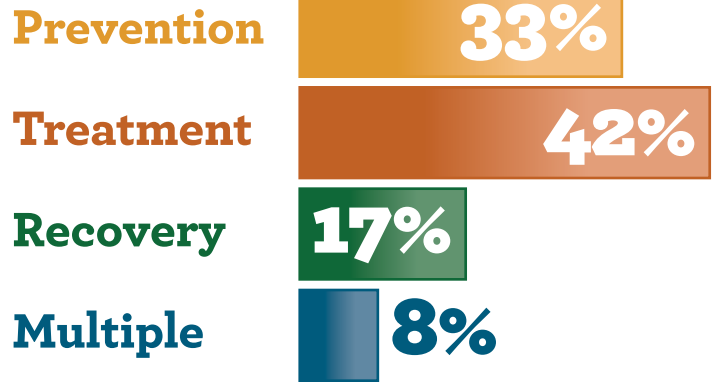


## TA Requests

The District of Columbia received 18 TA requests.



Most TA requests were related to OUD treatment or OUD prevention. This was followed by OUD recovery and a combination of OUD prevention, treatment, and recovery.



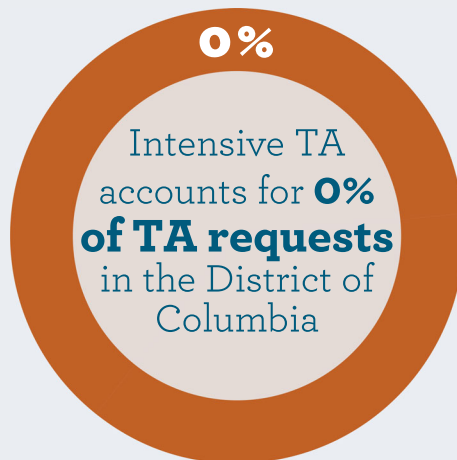

## Top 2 Strategies

TA Strategy	Virtual	Face-to-Face	Developing a formal implementation plan was the most frequent strategy for delivering TA, using both virtual and face-to-face delivery.
1. Develop a formal implementation plan	1	1	
2. Hold a training (build skills)	1	0	

## Intensive TA

Intensive TA requires a stable, ongoing relationship between ORN staff and the TA recipient in which they work to develop a plan. Intensive TA should result in changes to policy, program, practice, or operations that support increased recipient capacity of improved outcomes at one or more system levels.
